THE SHOREHAM GARDEN CLUB

A number of inquiries concerning the dead twigs on the trees in this vicinity points to the fact that an explanation would be of general interest.

The particular kind of cicada known as the seventeen year locust is responsible for the damage. After living her brief life cycle in the air, the female crawls out to the ends of the branches and, lays her eggs in them. The twigs die and eventually fall to the ground. There have been printed several articles to the effect that these insects do no harm to the foliage. That is true in so far as eating leaves is concerned but this destruction of young branches especially in newly transplanted stock, is very detrimental to the health of the tree or shrub and care and fertilization is indicated if

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
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
