


# SHOREHAMITEM

## BRAIN TWISTER

## HORTICULTURE

Although the gardening season is about over for most of the garden club members of Shoreham, there is an immense amount of work to be done before frost. Space prevents mentioning many essential tasks, but the one of winter mulch which is important should not be entirely neglected. Plants should not be mulched until after several killing frosts. The last week in November is an ideal time for this climate, where the warm weather is apt to linger long. It is not frosts of the Fall which do the most damage to have hardy plants, it is the hard freezing and thawing of the later part of the winter that does the greatest harm. If the mulch is put on too early, it provides a winter shelter for the mice who can do as much damage as the winter weather. After the frost, they seek a winter home, and by the time two or three hard frosts have occurred, they are all established somewhere else than in the garden, unless there are mole runs there for them to live in.

Daffodils should be planted early in the Fall for best results as should Madonna Lilies, tulips can be set any time before the ground freezes. If possible to do the clean up work in the garden during the Fall, so much the better, for the Fall weather is delightful, and the Spring most uncertain.




