




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

## ACCIDENT

Shoreham had its first big accident last Saturday night when Bud Heatley cracked up on the rock at the entrance of the Upham-Warden Memorial. The accident occurred at about 1:15 P.M. and Bud was given a summons on the arrival of the local police force.

Mr. and Mrs. Gordon Barttle and Mr. and Mrs. Herbert Frei will visit Mrs. Frei for the weekend.



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## HORTICULTURE

Mid-July-Time to order pansy seeds and plant as received. By September pansy plants should be large enough to transplant. A rough cold frame is the best place to plant them, for, although panies winter through generally in this climate, they will get a much earlier start if given a little protection during the winter. The frame can be made of boards the size of the standard cold frame sash and needs no special care. The back should be a trifle higher than the front so as to permit drainage. The top need not be put on until after a hard frost, when it can be left in position until Spring. Early in March it is advisable to lift the sash slightly to permit ventilation and the plants can be transferred to their permanent place by April 1st. Do not economize on pansy seed, get the best possible but don't expect to get the size some catalogs claim for their flowers. Greenhouse culture will produce such giant blooms but not our vigorous treatment of the plants.

There is a great deal of pruning to do now. All rambler roses need the dead blooms removed and most of the old wood. If polyantha roses are kept free of dead flowers, they will give continuous bloom through-out the summer. The lilacs and rhododendrons also need their seed pods taken off. If evergreens were not pruned in June, this is a good time to shape them up. The shrubs that have finished blooming should be thinned out and shaped up too.

Keep up dusting with sulphur dust for mildew.

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


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
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
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


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


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


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
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
