


DANCING EXHIBITION DON'T MISS IT

RED CROSS



HORTICULTURE

Aside from weeding and constant tying up and pruning, there is little to do now in the garden up to bulb planting time. Pruning, besides the attention to rank growing bushes and vines, should include the annuals. Do not let any plant of the latter class retain a faded flower, for with having produced, the function of the plant is completed and it may not bear any more good flowers. Kept pruned, it will keep on producing blossoms as long as the plant can live, the later the season, the more profuse the bloom per plant.

Speaking of planting bulbs, those who came to the lecture this past Tuesday evening must have carried away with them the helpful suggestion of planting their bulbs in a trench wide enough to place a line of complete plant food along both sides of the bulb.

Not having much to do in the garden gives one time to catch up on garden books.

The Family Album, by H.F. Fischer and G. Harshbarger (Univ. of Minnesota press, 2.50) is a reference book designed for simple identification of common plants, especially garden ones. 485 flower portraits with typical family characteristics should make identification possible for those who cannot use a plant key or who have not even the rudiments of botany. The pages of notes facing drawings contain

Interesting bits of plant lore and culture.

Designs for Outdoor

Living, by M. O. Goldsmith (George W. Stewart, N.Y. \$3.00) is very timely. Miss Goldsmith, an interior decorator by profession, has become quite well-known for her garden interest and writings. Now she presents a stimulating, thorough study of outdoor uses of property and gardens and their correlation to the house. The copious illustrations not only contribute to a handsome book, but help to drive home her points.

The complete Book of Garden Magic, by R. E. Biles (J. G. Ferguson, Chic. \$3.00) is a new addition of a book designed strictly for amateur gardeners. From planting a garden to a monthly calendar for garden work, to the special drawings which always tell a story, whether it is how to plant a tree or make a lawn or lay a walk, the book is full of helpful material pleasingly presented.

It is hoped that the Poison Ivy extermination campaign is well under way in everyone's property. The recent rains have softened the ground so that pulling the roots out is quite possible.
