2:35 Fifth Event Nurses Race Ladies up to 7 years.

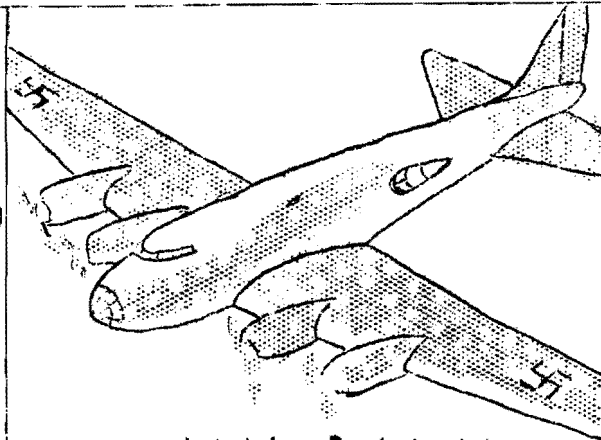
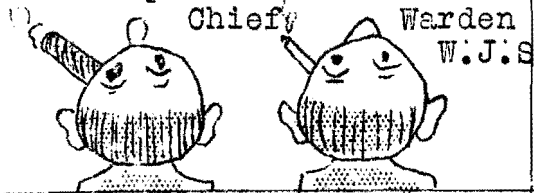
2:40 Sixth Event Prisoners' Escape, (formerly three-legged race). Mixed up to 12 years.

ATTENTION

Windows and other outlets of all dwellings, adjacent to the Sound shall be so shaded or darkened that direct lights therefrom are not visible from seaward. All dwellings shall draw shades down to a point where direct rays from interior lights, such as bridge or table lamps are not visible.

For the duration of the war no one will be allowed on the beach after dark, and no boats will be allowed out after dark unless the occupants are provided with special Coast Guard passes which extend them the privilege of fishing or boating after dark. Whether you possess a pass or not you are not allowed to use lights which are not shielded properly or to light fires on or near the beaches. These are not requests by the local authorities but Governmental orders which will be enforced by members of the Armed Forces. REMEMBER always stop when challenged.

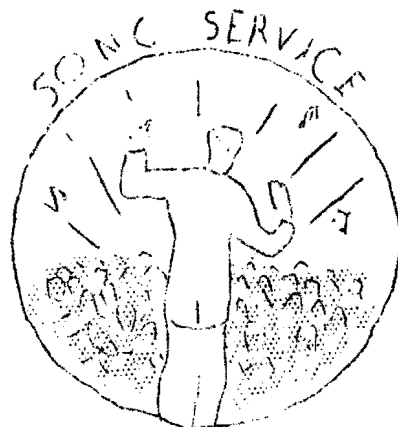

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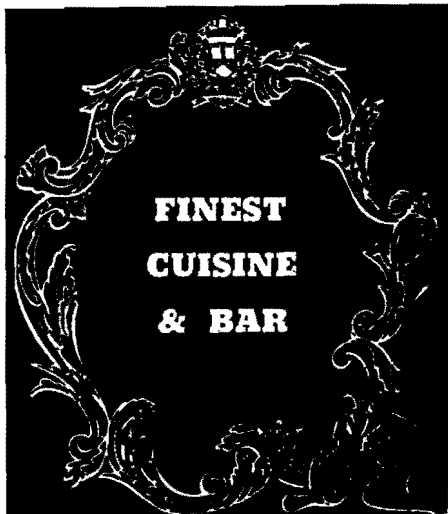
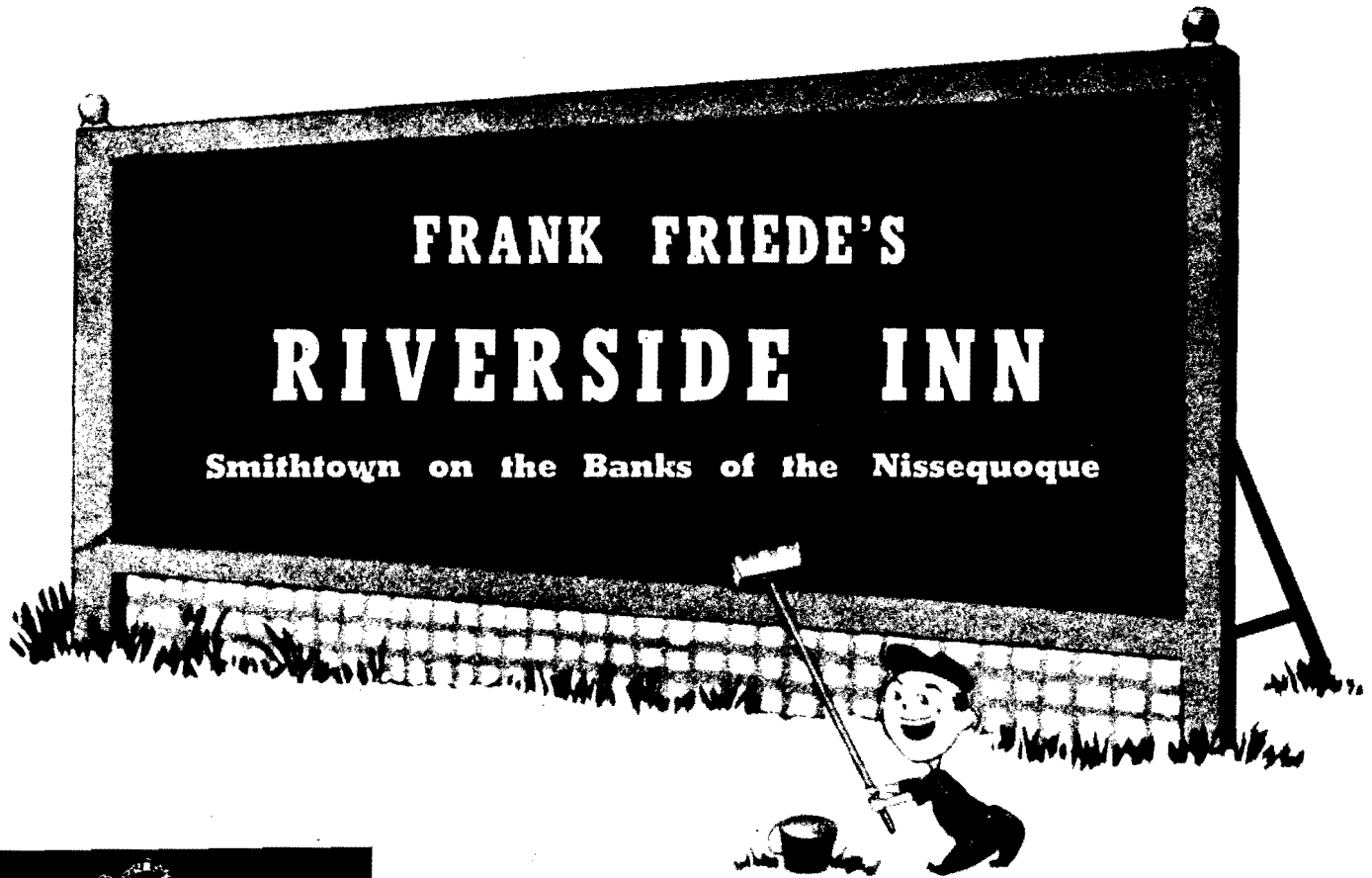
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
