

A list of chaperones for the Junior Social Activities will appear in the next issue.



Song Service will be held at the Club on Sunday, July fifth. It will be led by Dr. Horton Johnson. All are invited to attend.

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
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
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THE BARN

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BEACH NEWS

As we start the 1966 season, we look forward to another enjoyable season on Shoreham's beautiful beach.

Our lifeguard duties will be shared by Dick McGowan and Peter Vermylen, who are looking forward to making your beach a more enjoyable place. To make the summer more pleasant for all, the cooperation of each member is needed.

The lifeguards' tasks will be made much more difficult this year since they will have the added responsibility of policing the activities on our new raft, as well as protecting lives and keeping the beach clean. The following list of rules should be adhered to for everyone's enjoyment and safety:

1. The lifeguard is not a babysitter. Younger children should be accompanied by a parent or sitter.
2. Glass containers are not allowed on the beach.
3. Trash should be deposited in proper receptacles.
4. Dogs are not allowed on the beach and all dog owners are asked to cooperate on this matter.
5. Excessive horseplay and dangerous activities will not be allowed. The lifeguard is responsible for public safety and has the obligation to stop this activity before an accident occurs. Banishment from the club beach area will result if the lifeguard's warning is ignored.
6. The lifeguard has been requested to keep unauthorized persons off the beach. For this duty he will need the cooperation of each member.

The lifeguard will be on duty from 10:00 AM to 6:00 PM, except for his lunch hour from 12:00 AM to 1:00 PM.

TENNIS AND SAILING NEWS

This summer the Shoreham Country Club plans to give to its members qualified instruction in both sailing and tennis. We have obtained Allan Shapiro whom I believe will make us all better tennis players and sailors. Allan played varsity tennis at Hofstra University and has given private lessons for the past several years. He has sailed and raced a Snipe on the Sound for a number of years. At the present, Allan is working for his post graduate degree in business administration at Adelphi.

The tennis program will be organized into groups of four to six, dependent on the number of participants and their abilities. This will give Allan the opportunity to individually observe and instruct each player on his or her weak points. Allan will also be available for individual private instruction at the learners' own expense.

The sailing program will be arranged in a similar fashion offering individuals and small groups instruction in the basics and the finer points of sailing and racing.

Participating members and their children will be asked to pay ten dollars for both or either programs. All boys interested in joining the tennis program are asked to meet at the tennis courts at 9:00 A.M. Tuesday for an organizational meeting. All girls are asked to arrive at 10:30 A.M. The

LITTLE KNOWN FACTS ABOUT SHOREHAM

In 1925, the rare ring-tailed aardvark was captured by Basil Granville McQuade, a former resident of Shoreham. He then proceeded to record its deep guttural cry "ZOT" which is now in the archives of the Museum of Natural History.

Clifford "Cliff" Cornelius was a Shorehamite named the best cricket player on the Eastern seaboard back in 1894.

Clyde Otis Rutledge was one of the foremost authorities on butterflies and had a wide collection of the stultus glaebus.

All of Shoreham's land was nearly bought by the United Fruit Company for apple produce in 1931.

During the Revolutionary War, Shoreham played an important role by being a training ground for Washington's young recruits.

Indian Chief Yat-Han, killed in the Great Indian Battle by the brave Shoreham settlers after an unsuccessful attack by the natives upon the growing town, is buried in Shoreham between the Club field and the tennis courts.

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
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GREAT SOCIAL PROGRAM PLANNED FOR

free dances and live bands. Ah, that's the rub. It can be easily done with the co-operation of all teenagers in fund raising activities. 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
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SHOREHAM * * GRADUATES
