BEAUTIFYING SHOREHAM

The Shoreham Garden Club held its first Business Meeting and Informal Flower Exhibit, for this season, last Tuesday afternoon, June 26, at the home of Mrs. C. V. Pallister.

This Club has grown and progressed noticeably since its first small beginnings in 1929. Under the leadership of its president, Mrs. C. V. Pallister, it has developed into an active organization of which Shoreham is justly proud. As a result of its constant wise beauty treatments, Shoreham begins to acquire a new youth and beauty.

The Garden Club's first civic project, the Oval at the end of the Woodville Rd., (where it approaches the Sound and the entrance to the Shoreham Country Club) is a lovely spot of bloom and a credit to its originators. The rock with its inscribed plate was placed as a tribute to Mrs. Frances Upham Warden who was Shoreham's oldest resident and an original member of the Garden Club. The cedars which she planted many years before she died, at the age of 84, are lovingly preserved in the place of honor in the Oval.

Through the efforts of the Garden Club the unsightly buildings at the junction of our Woodville road and the main road, have been removed. In their place we may look forward to seeing some appropriate planting of trees, evergreens and shrubs, provided by the Brookhaven Township, who maintain a supply for just such worthy purposes.

Nothing daunted the Club has also used its influence to persuade the L.I.R.R. to make an effort to improve the grounds by the Station. The L.I.R.R. not only promised cooperation, but has proved its eagerness by starting to work.


