

THE GLORIOUS FOURTH

Our peace propagandists are constantly urging that we stress that side of the July 4th celebration which tends to better cement the ties of brotherhood, foster the spirit of freedom and uphold the principals of unity and peace.

Surely nowhere is the Fourth more appropriately celebrated than in our beautiful little Shoreham Village.

For twenty successive years, the same delightful ceremony has opened the day's events. We refer to the parade of the junior members who form in front of Mrs. A. W. Varian's residence where they are presented with flags and suitable favors by the Varians themselves. No child who presents himself there is ever left out. Led by the Mayor, with fan fare of bugle, flags flying and much tooting of horns, they proceed to the ball field, the tinliest tots having seats of honor in the forward cars. It was a Mr. Thompson who started this opening procedure and Mr. Varian has "carried on" ever since.

On the eve of the Fourth, twenty years ago, Mr. Channing Pollack was made constable of Shoreham Village. His interest has never waned and he has exerted a steady influence toward preserving Shoreham in its original charming seclusion. His home, the Parsonage, contains an atmosphere of peace and beauty.

Shoreham, originally Woodville Landing and later Wardencliff, was renamed by Mrs. Elizabeth Upham, who derived the name from England's "Shoreham-by-the-Sea."

Throughout Shoreham, each succeeding Fourth of July is notable for its spirit of comradeship, the reviving of old friendships, making of new ties. It is a holiday when we can count on seeing every Shoreham resident, past and present, home again. No matter how great the distance, nor how tiring the effort, friends and relatives gather for the Fourth and mingle thru the day in the various activities planned.

Our annual July 4th baseball game with Wading River drew a big enthusiastic crowd of spectators. It was umpired by Randall Warden. Wading River won the game with a score of 5 to 3.

Mr. Elmer Oliver supervised the ballgame and Randall Warden, Jr. took charge of the land and water athletic events.

SHOREHAM'S NEW DEVELOPMENT

Several years ago, to be certain that the land east of the Suffolk County Land Company's and west of the Bishop's property did not get into the hands of unethical speculators, the officers of that Company formed the Shoreham Realty Corporation and purchased the tract of approximately 320 acres known as the "Barnes" property. This spring the Corporation laid out some shorefront plots of not less than 100 feet frontage and are now extending water and electricity to them. Also a new 50' private road to the beach is under construction to be called "Valentine Road". The Barnes house, which is at the entrance to the new building sites, is a real Colonial house and was recently sold along with 14 acres by the Corporation. The new owner is already making extensive repairs and improvements. The Corporation has also sold several of the new sites. Even now the ring of the carpenter's hammer and the chop, chop, of the woodsman's axe is heard.

A number of picturesque paths have been cut through the property affording easy walking for the pedestrian or excellent riding for the equestrian. This property was bought primarily to safeguard against any undesirable development encroaching on, or being adjacent to, beautiful Shoreham.
