

SHOREHAM HARBOUR - ENGLAND

SHOREHAM-BY-SEA, ENGLAND

The residents of Rye, New York have started a unique idea of maintaining a friendly contact with Rye, England. Letters and local newspapers are exchanged. Visits are returned. Shoreham was given its name by Elizabeth R. Upham, after Shoreham-by-Sea, England. The English Shoreham is on the sea as its name implies about fifty-six miles by motor from London and five miles from Brighton, a well known bathing resort. In England, Shoreham is noted for having furnished the greatest number of ships in Queen Elizabeth's reign that went out to conquer the Spanish Armada. It still has one of the best preserved churches of very early pure Norman design, dating back to the eleventh century. The old Norman church with its square, strongly built tower, apparently was intended not only as a place of worship, but also as a fort in any emergency.

Its long narrow windows and the circu-

lar openings in the tower and the thick wall surrounding all, shows how necessary it was in those times to seek protection in the church.

A new town of Shoreham, called New Shoreham, arose about the thirteenth century and practically adjoins Old Shoreham. About this time the fickle sea changed the coast line of Old Shoreham filling in its harbour with sand and residue from the river, leaving the shipyards high and dry away from the water, now a mere estuary, where once a beautiful harbour existed. Old Shoreham's population is only about one hundred and fifty people at this time. The old church has the English Ivy around it. It has been suggested that possibly we could obtain some of this ivy and transplant it here, under the auspices of the Shoreham Garden Club. Perhaps it might be used around the rock dedicated to Mrs. Frances Upham Warden, in the oval at the end of Woodville Road, or in the triangle at the entrance to Shoreham.

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LECTURE ON WILD FLOWERS

The large attendance at the Shoreham Garden Club lecture on Wild Flowers last Tuesday evening, at the home of Mrs. H. W. Todd, is proof of the popularity of such informal instructive talks.

Mrs. Clayton Peters, of the New York State Institute of Applied Agriculture at Farmingdale, L. I., who delivered the lecture, showed many lovely colored lantern-slides - photographs of wild flowers native to this section of Long Island, including some which are now extinct. The photographs were of such a scale as to enable her to describe in detail the structure of the flower and its foliage.

The purpose of her talk was to urge the preservation of our wild flowers by preventing their destruction wherever possible and to encourage the transplanting of some of the more lovely species into our gardens. Unfortunately the few varieties of the orchid native to this locality and the lilies and the trilliums are now extinct in their wild state. The Butterfly Weed and Lady Slip are fast disappearing. The beautiful Trailing Arbutus is plentiful through our woods and though difficult to transplant with success it has nevertheless been done. Mrs. Peters mentioned that her first visit to Shoreham was with the head of the Brooklyn Botanical Gardens to collect Arbutus plants. It was twenty-five years ago that they took back with them three huge sacks of the Arbutus plants and soil. The plants are flourishing now in the Botanical Gardens.

The next meeting of the Garden Club is the Third Informal Flower Exhibit, to be held at the home Mrs. L. A. Eddy at two-thirty, P. M. on Tuesday, August 14. Members are urged to show their interest by entering the classes arranged, notice of which will be sent out in advance.

On Monday, August 20, at three P. M. an interesting cooperative meeting and exhibit will be held at Belleterre Manor. Mrs. David L. George will talk on and judge Flower Arrangements of Different Types and Periods. A prize will be awarded in each class. Shoreham is to send four exhibits. It is hoped a correspondingly large group of members from Shoreham will attend this meeting.

NOT AN EARTHQUAKE

Many residents of Shoreham have been wondering what the rumblings and the tremors are which they have heard and slightly felt. The answer is that on the eastern end of Shoreham Estates they are blasting out some tough old tree stumps that are in the path of the new "Valentine" road. There is also another private road under construction in the new section of the Shoreham Estates, known as "Beach" road, and, which terminates at the entrance to the circular parking place, which has a diameter of approximately 130 feet and from which there is a 20 foot wide path leading to the beach. The new poles, which one observes along the North Country Road, are to carry the electric power to the property. The new roads will be completed soon, but in the meantime, the old lane may be used. The lane is the old west entrance to the Barnes property, the first one you come to going towards Wading River.

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
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SHOREHAM ITEMS

The first three contestants in each event were presented with a medal, while the three winning men's relay team, which event was the outstanding one of the afternoon, were given a silver loving cup. The winners were Camp Grant, first; Lake Ronkonkoma, second; and Wading River, third.
