

If your plane were beginning to sputter anywhere over Europe and stop altogether, preferably over darkest France or Belgium, you might break a wing and hang your motor on one of the numberless poplar trees that line the roads, the fields and canals, but hobbling to the next village you will find a little inn, with a fat proprietor, honestly glad to see you. He will most probably be his own chef, turn out of his pots a respectable example of superb cooking and search your face for happiness while you eat it. It has happened to me in a pea-soup fog without ben-

efit of radio beacons, direction finders and only one pilot right after the war, in a hamlet some twenty kilometres south of Luneville, which in remoteness and size is the equivalent of Bismark, North Dakota. There, if you please, was to be had good wine and the best Tete de Veau Vinaigrette, and this brings us to the problems of our Hotels, Inns, Restaurants et al.

Of course we have the St. Regis, the Plaza, the Ritz - roof gardens with movable ceilings, two orchestras and impressive prices, but the waiters are dressed like the attendants in an insane asylum and carry this dramatic role to the suspi-

cion with which they look at you. When they do not lean against ivory columns and Sert panels they converse in Greek and Armenian, although they are all from the left bank of the Seine.

Enviably is their talent for completely going into trances in which the desperate calls and gestures from tables not their own can not be seen or heard. Let us not speak of their betters, the enemies of our ease, that open your taxi door, take your hat, find a table right next to the kitchen or your first wife.

If by any chance you do not like this, here is the other alternative - the melancholy, flybespecked emporiums, beautiful only in retrospect, when you are long out of them and far away. Bistro's with a lithograph of Niagara Falls, our President and the Roman Coliseum, a waiter designed by Van Gogh, who picks his teeth, leans over the table and taking the sticky menu out of your hand, hisses - "where do you see green peas?"

Between these two and worse than either because it is altogether without color and character, is the chain restaurant, and that quaint atrocity, "Ye Herrings Neste", "Kumm Inn", "Ye Bishop's

Seate", etc. etc. etc. At the bottom, beyond criticism, are the Taverns done in the very best early Bronx gothic.

To establish, run and make a go of a house that avoids being any of the exhibits we have looked at is one of the most difficult undertakings, and if we succeed in bringing under the roof of the onetime "Maples Hotel" in Shoreham, a cook who loves his pots and pans, service without servility, and decorations that are gay and fresh, you can be honestly proud of it - there are few of them.
