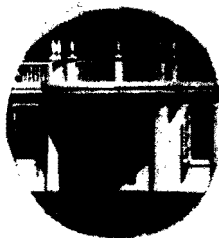

It was a glorious 4th of July for Shoreham, although the rain dampened the ardor somewhat.

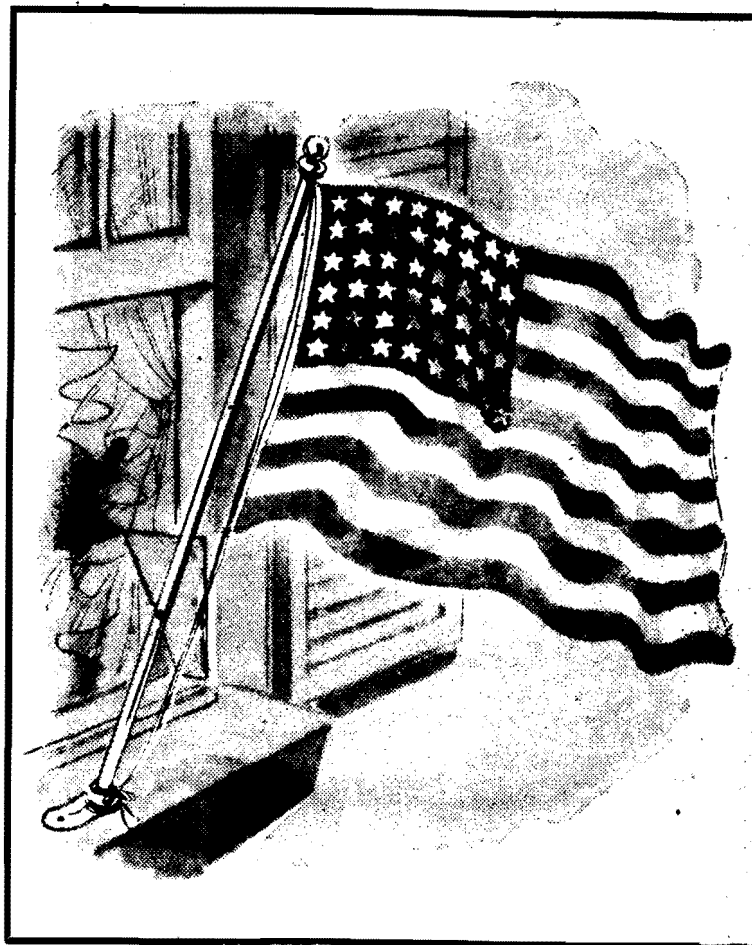
One of our own boys was back from sea duty and we enjoyed seeing and talking with Lt. (j.g.) William Sedgwick.

Due to the war activities the police department has naturally added duties, and we ask all the residents to cooperate as much as possible.

THINGS TO DO - Carry on normally and enjoy Shoreham.

THINGS NOT TO DO - Boating and fishing after sunset. Walking on the beach at night. Bright house lighting. The police are instructed to be courteous at all times, but kindly do not call the police station for the policemen to render taxi service unless in an emergency. Children unescorted at night should not roam our Streets. A parent phoning the night policeman for an escort for the children going home will gladly assist.

LIFE GUARD

EDWIN BARNHART - Daily 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. - except Tuesdays - Day-off.

DUTIES - Rake the beach daily. Keep the life boat and floats in condition.

To watch out for those in need of assistance, warn those who are too daring and to render first aid, if needed. The Life Guard will bring down to the beach each morning umbrellas and chairs from the Club for the Club members who have notified him in advance. He must not leave the beach while there is activity in the water, to render this service. He will likewise bring up the Club members' umbrellas and chairs at the end of each day.

TO THE PARENTS: The life-guard is not to take over the responsibility of the parents in watching the children.
